Delectable Dublin: Take a connoisseurs'

tour of the Guinness Factory, including a tasting of the iconic stout. Afterward, embark on an insider culinary walking tour of the city, visiting a range of bakeries, street markets, cheesemongers and specialty shops, such as Sheridan's and Murphy's Ice Cream.

Dublin Art and Artifacts: Visit the

National Gallery of Ireland, where an art expert leads you to its most precious artworks. Then proceed to Number 10, Dublin's most exclusive private venue. Set on the banks of the River Liffey, this beautiful Georgian home contains a treasure trove of fine art and antiques. Owner John Lynch personally welcomes you with colorful stories and insights into his priceless collection over silver-service traditional tea.

Dine with the Jameson Sisters:

The three Jameson sisters — Kristin, Andrea and Tara — are honored to open their ancestral home, Tourin House, to you for the first time. Ninthgeneration descendants of John Jameson (of Irish whiskey fame), the sisters lead you on a tour through their handsome villa, built in 1840 in Italianate style, and its stunning gardens.

Castles and Countryside of Lore:

Embark on a colossal journey along the UNESCOdesignated Giant's Causeway to Bushmills

Distillery to call on its resident ghost, The Grey Lady. Visit Newgrange, a Neolithic monument built 500 years before the Great Pyramids. Take a VIP tour through the House of Waterford Crystal, explore the bustling English Market in Cork, and spend an evening with a traditional Irish seanachie (storyteller). These are just a few of the highlights of an 11-day tour that includes stays at two of Ireland's most famed castles, Ashford and Dromoland.



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
